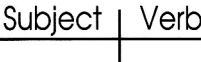
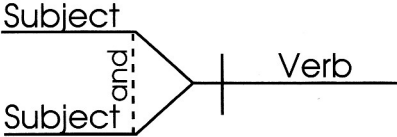

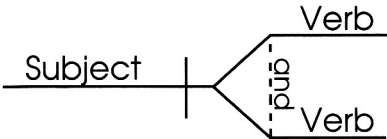
Subject—Verb



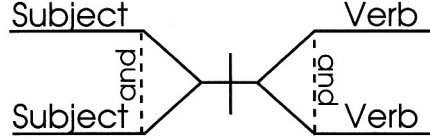
Compound Subject



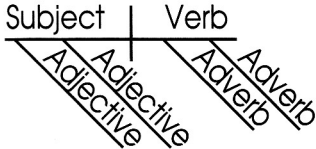
Compound Verb



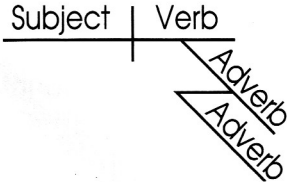
Compound Subject—Compound Verb



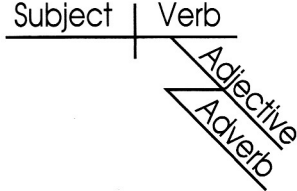
Subject—Verb with Adjectives and Adverbs



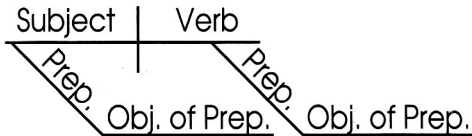
Adverb Modifying Adverb



Adverb Modifying Adjective

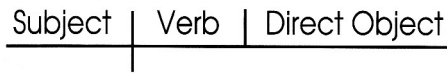

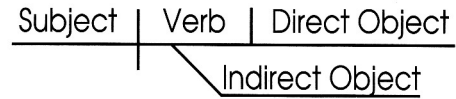

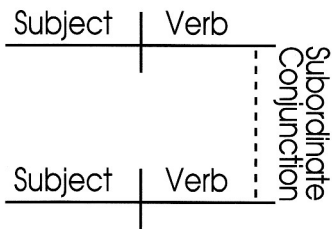

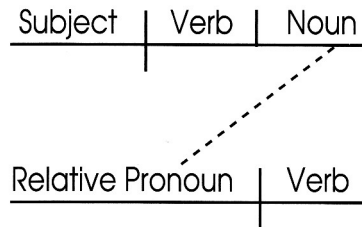

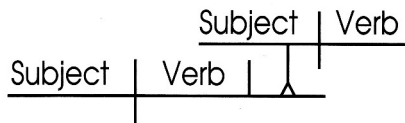
Adverb Clauses—A dashed line connects the verb in the main clause to the verb in the subordinate clause



Adjective Clause—A dashed line connects the relative pronoun to the noun it modifies.

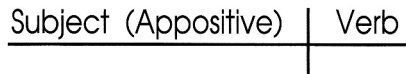


Noun Clauses—The noun clause stands on a stilt above the area where it functions in the sentence.

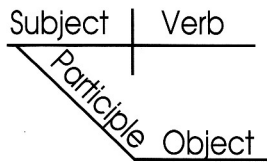


Diagramming Patterns, continued

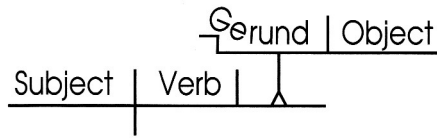
Appositives—Appositives are placed in parentheses next to the word described.



Participial Phrases—Participles are placed on a line attached to the word modified.



Gerund Phrases—Gerunds are placed on a stilt above the area where they function in the sentence.



Infinitive Phrase—Infinitives used as nouns are placed on a stilt above the area where they function in the sentence. Infinitives used as adjectives or adverbs are placed on a stilt above a line connected to the word modified.
